# Moving from Children's to Adult Audiology Services

## When will this happen?

- At 16 years: some people will prefer to transition at this age if they are leaving school to start work.
- At 18 years: some people prefer to wait until they have finished at college or sixth form and transition when they are 18 years old.

# What will happen?

We will:

- Help you to understand more about your hearing levels and discuss with you how this may affect communication in different situations.
- Help you to learn how to care for your hearing aid, including changing the tubes on the earmoulds yourself if you want to.
- Give information on support and help available in a variety of situations (for example, starting a job, college, University or moving away from home).
- Give you information on equipment which you might find helpful to use with your hearing aids.

#### **How is the Adult Audiology Service different?**

**Making appointments:** We will no longer automatically send you appointments every 6 or 12 months. You will be responsible for telling us if/when you would like an appointment to have your hearing tested and your hearing aid(s) checked. Your hearing aids will no longer be maintained by a Teacher of the Deaf.

**Location:** Adult Audiology at Leighton Hospital is near the Outpatients Department - if you arrive in the Main Outpatients entrance, turn left immediately and Audiology is a few metres down this corridor.

If you live closer to Northwich, you might prefer to have some or all of your appointments at Victoria Infirmary. You can call to arrange this, although appointments are limited and only on certain days of the week. We also run drop-in repair clinics here on certain days of the week.

**Staff:** Some of the paediatric team are also part of the adult team so you may see familiar faces at your new appointments. However, some staff will be new to you.

## When do I need to attend Audiology?

- If your **hearing aid stops working** or doesn't sound quite right, if you need a **new mould** or need **new tubing**, you should attend one of our drop-in repair sessions (see below for opening hours).
- Tubing needs replacing every 3-6 months. We can show you how to do this yourself if you would prefer.
- If you think your hearing has changed, or it has been over 3 years since your last hearing test, you should contact us by phone or attend a drop-in repair session to arrange a hearing test. We will usually recommend that your hearing aid is checked first (to ensure it is still working well).

Please note: We charge adult patients up to £159 for the loss or non-accidental damage of a hearing aid.

#### **Drop-in repair clinics at Leighton Hospital:**

Monday, Thursday and Friday: 9.00 a.m. – 12.00 midday. Tuesday and Wednesday: 1.30 p.m. – 4.00 p.m.

No appointment is needed, but you may have to wait a long time to be seen as these sessions can be very busy.

☐Where do you get batteries from?

**Batteries:** Details of how and when you can get your batteries are in your brown battery record book:

• Batteries can be collected from the Adult Audiology Department in Leighton Hospital at the following times:

Monday, Thursday and Friday: 9.00 a.m. – 12.00 midday. Tuesday and Wednesday: 1.30 p.m. – 4.00 p.m.

- They may also be available from reception at:
  - o Eagle Bridge Health Centre, Crewe
  - o Church View Health Centre, Nantwich
  - Alsager Health Centre
  - o Ashfields Clinic, Sandbach
  - Winsford Clinic on Dene Drive
  - o Victoria Infirmary, Northwich
  - o The Health Centre, Holmes Chapel
- Batteries can only be issued when you or a relative show your brown battery record book. If you do not have a brown battery record book, these can be purchased from the Adult Audiology Department.
- Or you can post your brown battery record book to the department with a stamped addressed envelope (a "large" stamp is required due to the thickness of the batteries) and we will send you some new batteries through the post. The address for the Audiology department is:

It is often helpful if you bring your brown battery record book with you each time you attend the Audiology Department.

#### What will NOT change after you move to the Adult Service?

#### **Hearing aids**

We will **NOT**:

- Automatically change the hearing aids you have (although we will upgrade them if they are old / unsuitable).
- Change how your hearing aids have been set (unless your hearing needs have changed).
- Make changes to your hearing aids without discussing them with you and reaching a decision together.

# What if I move away permanently? E.g. to start a new job

When you move out of the area on a permanent basis you will probably want to change your GP to one that is close to your new home. You will need to ask your new GP to refer you to the Audiology Service near your new home. You may need to have an appointment with the new Audiology Service to have your hearing checked.

We will give you a summary sheet with information about how your hearing aids have been set and any other relevant information such as what type of ear mould you prefer, which you can take to your new Audiology Service.

We recommend that you register with a GP close to where you live during term time so that you have easy access to medical care if/when you need it. If you do register with a GP at your term time address and you then need to see a doctor during the holidays when you are at home, your old GP practice will usually register you as a temporary patient so that you can have an appointment with them.

If you have changed your GP, you will need to ask your new GP to refer you to the Audiology Service nearest your term time address. The new Audiology department may not be able to adjust your current hearing aids, and may offer you a different aid. We are able to support Oticon and Phonak hearing aids in our service should you wish to come back to us at any time.

Alternatively, you may choose to only receive batteries from your new GP and remain under the care of Leighton Hospital Audiology service.

Important: Please do not wait until your hearing aids have broken before you contact your GP for a referral to Audiology. They may not be able to offer you an appointment for a number of weeks and you will be left without a useable hearing aid. If you find yourself without usable hearing aids, please contact us and we will help you.

Your new hospital should contact us for your Audiology patient records.
