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| If your official letter has not arrived one week prior to your scheduled theatre date, then you should contact the Theatre Schedulers on 01270 278110. |
| If you have any changes to your health after your assessment visit, then you should telephone the Pre-operative Assessment Clinic on 01270 612468 between 3.30pm and 4.30pm, Monday to Friday (excluding Bank Holidays). |
| You are having your operation under General Anaesthetic, therefore: |
| Please do not eat from You can drink water only until if you are required to take medication. |
| The pre-assessment nurse will instruct you on what medications you can take on the day of your operation. |
| Do not take the following medication: |
| If you are on warfarin, please attend the anticoagulant clinic one week prior to your admission date. |
| Please bring in a list of all your medications and your warfarin book (if applicable). |
| If staying overnight bring your overnight clothing, toiletries, medications and contact numbers. |



Information for patients attending the Treatment Centre for a General Anaesthetic

On Arrival

When you arrive at the Treatment Centre admission area you will be greeted by a member of staff.

Prior to your operation:

- Staff will check if there are any medical/medication changes since your Pre-Operative Assessment.
- You may have eye drops in your eye(s). These dilate the pupil to aid the surgeon during the operation.
- You will be reviewed by the surgeon who will confirm/take consent, mark your forehead with an arrow to indicate which eye is to be operated on and answer any questions you may have.
- An anaesthetist will visit you and ask some questions regarding your health, medications and allergies.
- You will change into a theatre gown. Dentures can be left in until you enter the anaesthetic room or placed in a denture pot prior to leaving the waiting area.
- Please leave jewellery and other valuables at home. Your wedding ring will be secured with tape. A locker will be available for you to put your belongings in.
- However, the Trust takes no responsibility for loss or damage of personal items.
- Prior to theatre a checklist will be completed ensuring correct identity, test results and specific care you may need in theatre.

Arriving at theatre

- On arrival a member of the theatre team will greet you.
- The checklist will be repeated.
- You will be positioned on the anaesthetic trolley and made comfortable prior to your general anaesthetic.
- Your blood pressure, pulse and oxygen levels will be recorded.
- A venflon (a small tube) will be inserted into a vein on the back of your hand or arm prior to the anaesthetic. This enables the anaesthetist to give the anaesthetic drugs.
- Once you are under the anaesthetic, you will be transferred into theatre for your operation.

After your operation

- When your surgery is complete you will be transferred to the recovery area.
- Your blood pressure, pulse and oxygen levels will be monitored.
- When recovered you will be transferred to the ward area where refreshments will be offered. If you are staying overnight you will be transferred from the ward area to a ward.
- Your theatre gown and venflon will be removed and you will change into your clothes.
- You may be given a tablet to prevent a rise in eye pressure after your operation.

Discharge

- The nurse will provide you and your relative/carer with all the necessary information, prescription drops, instructions and contact numbers prior to discharge.
- You must not drive yourself home.
- You may be asked to return the following day to the Eye Care Centre to be reviewed or you may receive a phone call instead.
- Your next follow-up appointment can vary from one to six weeks depending on your surgeon's request.
